HEROES OF ROME CHASE MORE GLORY

As three Ryder Cup winners target the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship, Bob MacIntyre represents the best chance of a first Scottish winner since 2005, while Tommy Fleetwood hopes to realise his Swilken Bridge dream

obert MacIntyre wants his emotional homecoming to Scotland as a Ryder Cup hero to be the start of a drive into the world's top 50 and a chance to achieve more of his golfing ambitions.

"I want to win the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship and it is business as usual for me this week," said MacIntyre, one of three players from Europe's victorious team in Rome to be teeing up at Carnoustie, Kingsbarns and St Andrews, along with English duo Tommy Fleetwood and Matt Fitzpatrick.

"Everything that happened at

the Ryder Cup was a dream come true. It was an incredible experience and sitting down afterwards with the trophy – just the 13 of us in a room with our captain Luke Donald – is a memory that will live with me forever. I dreamed of certain things and hoped they would happen. To play in a Ryder Cup, to win a Ryder Cup, it was just a dream, but you've got to dream it before you can believe it.

"My only goal now, in the immediate future, is to get into the top 50 by Christmas and I think that's very much achievable. My golf's been a bit up and down over the last month or so, because there's been a lot of stress going on, but now I can cruise around and play aggressively. I feel that my energy levels are good."

MacIntyre, 27, currently ranked 55th in the world and 10th in the Race to Dubai, admits he has "a huge call to make" in terms of how he structures his life going forward to give himself the best chance of taking his career to the next level.

"I was speaking to my mum about it," said the popular Scot, following a memorable welcome home party in Oban on Monday evening. "I enjoy my family time and the reason I play golf is to support people who are close to me," added MacIntyre, who plans to set up a foundation in the future to help the life ambitions of those from similar backgrounds in the west of Scotland, across a wide field that includes sport and music.



what I have to do now to achieve what I want in golf, whether that's playing more on the PGA tour in America or whatever. I need to weigh everything up and see if I am willing to make those changes.

"I am lucky enough to have the most supportive family around me, from my sisters to my parents who have worked in numerous jobs to give me the chance to do what I do."

Close family are also playing an important role this week for both Matt Fitzpatrick, who is paired with mum Sue in the Team Championship and has brother Alex alongside him in the professional ranks, and Fleetwood, who is being supported this week by dad Pete.

Winning the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship is also high on Fleetwood's list of golfing ambitions. "I think this is my 13th Dunhill Links Championship, and it's the event I've probably played the most on the European Tour," said Fleetwood.

"It's an event that I've always really wanted to win and I still kind of picture myself with the trophy on the Swilken Bridge and it's just not happened yet. I'll absolutely be giving it my all this week for sure."

Former US Open champion Fitzpatrick said: "Playing with mum last year was really special and it's great to be able to do it again this time. I think my dad would love to play too but at the moment in his career Alex can't really pick and choose his partners!


"This is such a nice week to have after the Ryder Cup. All three courses are great golf courses, great layouts. I think for this format, that's what makes it enjoyable. It's not high rough. You hit fairways and it's pretty enjoyable."

For Fitzpatrick, Fleetwood and MacIntyre, of course, thoughts of last week's triumph in Rome will never be far away as they play in front of the home galleries – the European team members are still messaging each other and have a group call next week to discuss their future individual career plans.

Fleetwood, for one, still replays in his head the tee shot at Marco Simone's short par-four 16th in Sunday's singles which put him in position to make sure the Ryder Cup returned to Europe.

"It was just an amazing opportunity to step up when one good shot was going to win the Ryder Cup, which still gives me goosebumps now," said Fleetwood. "You practice your whole life and all of a sudden, me, Tommy Fleetwood from Southport, is stood there with one good shot to win the Ryder Cup. I still can't believe it went straight!"







BRITTANY DOES IT FOR THE KIDS

mpressing her young children is Brittany Horschel's major driving force this week as she makes her Alfred Dunhill Links Championship debut alongside husband Billy, a seven-time PGA Tour winner.

"It's a dream come true for me, after caddying for Billy last year," said Brittany, an impressive scratch golfer who says she is determined to play well. "I have very high expectations of myself and I am very competitive!"

Brittany and Billy were married in 2010, after first meeting at the

University of Florida, where Brittany played on the university golf team. "I stopped playing after college, for about 10 to 15 years, but I got back into the game a few years ago," said Brittany.

"Our young son Axel, who is four, already loves his golf and so I play a bit with him back at home. It will be great to play alongside Billy this week and create a lifelong memory together.

"I'm not nervous playing with him but of course I will be very nervous when I'm on the first tee on Thursday! But I will be very excited too, and I will be happy to get on with the round once that's out the way.

"I know my way around the three courses, after last year, but this is the first time I've actually played links golf so that is really exciting, as is the chance to show my kids what Mom can do!"

Daughters Skylar (nine) and Colbie (six) will be watching closely to see how Brittany gets on.

"I'm looking forward so much to playing every course, but the Old Course with all its history is the one I'm sure will be the highlight." The Alfred Dunhill Links Championship celebrates links golf at its finest and is played over the Old Course at St Andrews, the Championship Course at Carnoustie and Kingsbarns Golf Links. The final round, after the cut is made on Saturday, is played over the Old Course.

With a total prize fund of US\$5million, there are two separate competitions - an individual professional tournament and a Team Championship, in which each professional is paired with an amateur.

OLD COURSE IS ALL THAT JAZZ FOR CATHERINE

atherine Zeta-Jones is making her debut at the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship today – and claims that teeing it up on the first at St Andrews will be more nerve-wracking than performing at the Oscars.

The Welsh actress – who won an Academy Award for her performance as Velma Kelly in Chicago in 2002 and reprised her role onstage at the 2013 ceremony – has previously attended the tournament in the company of her husband and fellow actor Michael Douglas, but finally overcame her fears to take up the invitation to play.

"I'm the type of person who can go on stage and sing and dance at the Oscars but put me on the first tee at St Andrews and it's a different story," she said.

"I arrived on Monday and got the chance to play the Old Course, so I literally dropped my bags and came out. Then I played Kingsbarns on Tuesday.

"I've always loved this event. I've

played a few practice rounds and my husband has been a great supporter. So, when the invitation came this year, I embraced my fears and said 'yes'."

Catherine was delighted to meet another Welsh star, Gareth Bale, who is also making his Dunhill debut and is already attracting attention for the quality of his golf game. "I was so thrilled to meet him. We're very proud of Gareth in Wales. I wouldn't be surprised if he goes pro – have you seen him hit a golf ball? It's a treat."

Zeta-Jones' love affair with the sport stretches back to the mid Nineties, when she was shooting a movie called The Phantom on the east coast of Australia. "I was on weather cover, which meant if it rained, I got to do my scenes. It was summer in Australia, so the chances of rain were very small. I couldn't get suntanned because of continuity in the film, so I put a lot of sunblock on, covered my face and bought my first set of golf clubs. I became a golf fanatic."





722 NOT OUT! HOWELL BREAKS TOUR RECORD

27 years after his debut, a former champion returns to make Tour history and recall highlights of a unique career

hen David Howell tees it up at Kingsbarns today, he will be making history by passing Miguel Angel Jimenez's record for the most appearances in European / DP World Tour events. And what better time and place to do it than at the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship, 10 years on from one of the former Ryder Cup star's biggest wins.

Howell made his European Tour debut in 1996 at the Dimension Data Pro-Am in South Africa and a week later finished eighth in the Alfred Dunhill Championship at Houghton. It was the start of a career that has spanned four decades and includes winning the Dunhill Links in 2013, when he partnered Hugh Grant, pictured left.

What were the highlights? "It was my dream to play in a winning Ryder Cup side," said Howell. "To play in the 2004 side was special. Then winning the BMW PGA, the nearest thing to a Major Championship on our Tour. That was really me at the peak of my powers, dominating a field.

"And then the 2013 Dunhill, when I managed to get it across the line, with Hugh Grant there as my partner. It was incredible. To win in a play-off, holing a nice putt on a picture-perfect evening with the shadows lengthening, was incredible. I'm delighted that I was able to win at St Andrews."



DUNHILL KEY TO PGA WIN

yan Fox believes his win at the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship in emotional circumstances last year changed the course of his career – and led to another landmark win last month.

Fox won a dramatic BMW PGA Championship at Wentworth three weeks ago and while his fourth European Tour title is the biggest success of his career to date, the New Zealander says the turning point came at St Andrews, 11 months earlier.

"To win the BMW PGA was a special moment in my life. I now feel I have the chance to make even more significant steps forward," said Fox.

"But I will never underestimate the importance of winning the



Alfred Dunhill Links last year. That victory made me realise that I could win at the highest level and encouraged me to play more events around the world.

"The next wonderful thing that could happen to me is to defend my Dunhill title at St Andrews, and that's what I'm looking to do."

Fox's win here in 2022 was a poignant one, coming seven months after the death of his

friend and former amateur partner at this event, Shane Warne.

"He was one of my idols and it took on more meaning last year with him not being there," said Fox. "I'm not sure if I believe in stuff like this, but I felt really calm for the week, it felt like Warnie was there. He was renowned as a competitor and we had such a great time in all the Dunhill Links we'd played together."



AP MISSES WINNER'S MENTALITY ON COURSE

The problem with golf?
'You can't blame the horse!'
says McCoy

P McCoy's mentality may have been the key to a successful horse racing career – but the 20-times Champion Jockey says that he is unable to bring the same positive mental attitude to golf.

The Northern Irishman – competing in his eighth Alfred Dunhill Links Championship – said: "I actually had a much more positive attitude riding horses than I do playing golf. I thought I was going to win everything when I was racing, whereas with golf it's the opposite. Golf is a frustrating game.

"Racing is not like golf, where you can blame the horse—you can't blame the same clubs that Jon Rahm uses! But I absolutely love it and there are days when you hit it OK and you think, 'Oh yeah, I'm a golfer today'.

"I can see why mentally it is very hard [for the pros]. You go to the range and they can all hit balls to a certain standard, so you think, 'Why doesn't he win golf tournaments?' You have to have a strong mental attitude."

McCoy has only made the cut once in the Team Championship, but jokes that his time has come this year. "I made a cut once with Graeme McDowell and have not got close since, but I'm going to be top of the leaderboard all the way this week!"

TOUR STOP SUITS MIKE

ock superstar Mike Rutherford ditched his guitar for his golf clubs in June and feels wellprepared for the challenge of this year's Championship.

"I finished touring with Mike and the Mechanics in June, so I've played a lot of golf this year," said Rutherford, whose wife, Angie, is also in the Team Championship.

"I've known Ronan Keating and Tom Chaplin a long time, but I get to know them more each year here. It's about people and enjoying time together."

TEST DUO REUNITE FOR LINKS ENCORE

Jimmy Anderson and Stuart Broad have played all three courses together, but never with the stakes this high

immy Anderson and Stuart Broad, one of sport's greatest double acts, will never play cricket together again following Broad's decision to retire at the end of this year's drawn Ashes Test series against Australia. But the England cricket legends, long-standing friends off the field, will continue to play competitive rounds of golf against each other on a regular basis – and are thrilled to be doing so this week as debutants in the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship.

"We have always been very keen



on our golf and we've played a lot together," said Anderson, who has a slightly lower handicap (3) than his former fast bowling partner.

"We've both played these three courses before, on social trips to Scotland, but it's great to be invited to be a part of this tournament."

Anderson, who at 41 insists he still has more to give England at Test level, has taken a record 690 wickets in 183 Test appearances. Broad's 167 Tests brought him 604 wickets and, between them, the pair have taken more than 2,000 first-class wickets.

Broad, uniquely, finished his Test career at the Oval in July by hitting the last ball he faced for six and taking a wicket with the final ball he bowled.

"We loved playing together and neither of us could have achieved what we have without the other," said Anderson, who made his Test debut in May 2003 – four and a half years before Broad.

Broad, 37, plays golf left-handed — as he batted — but Anderson, who also bats left-handed, is a right-handed golfer. "We've all been telling Jimmy for years he should bat right-handed!" said Broad.





TEAM WIN STILL 'LIKE A DREAM' FOR ALEX

merican art dealer Alex Acquavella painted his own masterpiece at the Alfred Dunhill Links Championship 12 months ago – but he can still barely believe it happened. Acquavella, pictured during last year's Championship, plays his golf at National and Shinnecock Hills. He won the Team Championship by three shots along with his English pro partner Callum Shinkwin.

"It still feels like a dream," he said. "It comes up a lot. And it's funny because I'm still the same golfer I was before. I still struggle on the course at times. But it was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity and one I'll never forget.

"I figured we were in contention but I didn't look at the scoreboard until the 17th green, and I saw that we were up by two shots. I felt pretty comfortable then but also happy Callum was there to finish it off."


OLD COURSE CARNOUSTIE KINGSBARNS
